More tips for the quilter

NEEDHAM -- There are fourteen of these tips. Hope you received the first three last week

Quilting Tip #4 — Start each quilting project with a new needle. A size

80/12 universal needle works great with all cotton fabrics and 100% cotton thread, weight 50/3.

Quilting Tip #5 — Press your seams flat on wrong side of fabric first then press seam allowance to one side. Press gently with a dry

iron. Steam can be used to flatten your block but be sure you do not stretch the fabrics as you press. Allow the steam to dry before you pick up your block.

Quilting Tip #6 — Having trouble keeping your needles identified? Label the sections of a

tomato pin cushion with your different needle sizes you use and keep them there until needed again.

"ICE"-IN CASE OF EMERGENCY

The "ICE" idea is catching on! It is a very simple, yet important, method of contact for you or a loved one, in case of an emergency.

The idea was thought up by a paramedic who found that when he went to accident scenes, most victims always had a cell phone, but authorities didn't know which numbers to call. He, therefore, thought that it would be a good idea if there was a nationally recognized name under which to file "next of kin". Following a disaster in London, the East Anglican Ambulance Service launched a national "In Case of Emergency (ICE)" campaign. So far, it has been very successful in reaching the right people at the right time.

The idea is that you store the word "ICE" in your mobile phone address book, and with it, enter the number of the person you want to be contacted "In Case of Emergency".

In an emergency situation, Emergency Services personnel and hospital staff would then be able to quickly contact your next of kin, by simply dialing the number programmed under "ICE". For more than one contact name, simply enter ICE-1, ICE-2, ICE-3, etc. It really could save your life, or put a loved one's mind to rest. A great little idea that will make a big difference!
